They are like trees planted by streams of water, which yield their fruit in its season. Psalm 1:3a.

Six years have passed since the grand celebration marking the 500th anniversary of the Christian Reformation. Despite the passage of time, the transformative journey of the Church under the guidance of God continues. At Peace Memorial Church, we are committed to embodying the values of love and generosity as we navigate this journey together.

The Psalms, an integral part of the Bible, often use the metaphor of animals searching for water to describe the quest for God.
